FFY 2026 DWSRF Intended Use Plan Amendment:

DWSRF No. 17629: Town of Essex, Essex County. The project cost as listed in the DWSRF IUP is increased to a total project cost of \$650,000 for long-term financing.

DWSRF No. 18768: Town of Campbell, Steuben County. The project cost as listed in the DWSRF IUP is increased to a total project cost of \$175,000 for long-term financing.

DWSRF No. 18328: City of Plattsburgh, Clinton County. The project cost as listed in the DWSRF IUP is increased to a total project cost of \$500,000 for long-term financing.

DWSRF No. 19093: City of Plattsburgh, Clinton County. The Department mistakenly removed the project from the IUP. The project has been added back to the Annual List and the Infrastructure Improvement and Jobs Act General Supplemental (IIJA-GS) list.

DWSRF No. 18127: Village of Interlaken, Seneca County. The project cost as listed in the DWSRF IUP is increased to a total project cost of \$2,500,000 due to construction bid prices exceeding original estimates.

DWSRF No. 19861: City of Buffalo, Erie County. The Department discovered a data entry error and increased the project score from 35 points to 40 points. This change places the project above project No. 19915 (City of Ithaca) on the Infrastructure Improvement and Jobs Act Lead Service Line Replacement (IIJA-LSLR) list.

The New York State Department of Health has determined that the amendment is necessary, reasonable, and in the interest of protecting public health. The amendment will not adversely affect any project on the IUP Project Annual List above the subsidized funding line. Except as noted above, there are no other changes to the IUP as a result of this Amendment No. 2 of the FFY 2026 IUP.
