What are Social Care Networks?

Social Care Networks (SCNs) are regional networks of community-based organizations, health care providers, and other partners that are expanding access to services to address health-related social needs (HRSNs) among Medicaid members. The program is intended to reach pregnant / postpartum persons, children, and other Medicaid populations.

SCNs connect Medicaid Members who qualify to HRSN services like:



HOUSING SUPPORT



FOOD AND NUTRITION SUPPORT



TRANSPORTATION



SOCIAL CARE MANAGEMENT

How do SCNs support pregnant / postpartum members and children?

SCNs address social needs that can help with healthy pregnancies, perinatal mental health, and early childhood development.

SCN program benefits include:

- Providing qualifying pregnant / postpartum members and children with access to newly covered HRSN services, such as pantry stocking during pregnancy and up to 12 months postpartum
- Delivering screenings and services in a convenient and accessible way for the whole family or household
- Connecting pregnant / postpartum members and children to qualifying services and ensuring their needs are met through closed loop referrals

- Join an SCN to screen, navigate, and deliver HRSN services and receive reimbursement if you are a community-based organization, health care, or behavioral health provider
