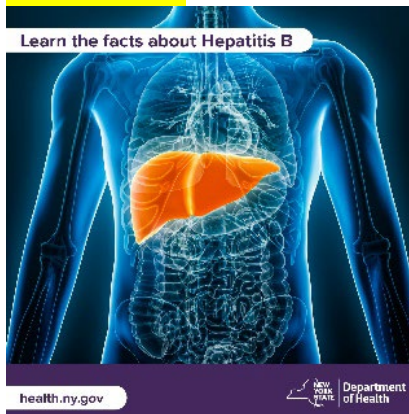

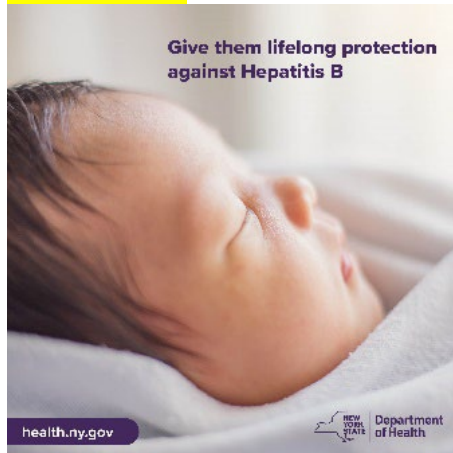

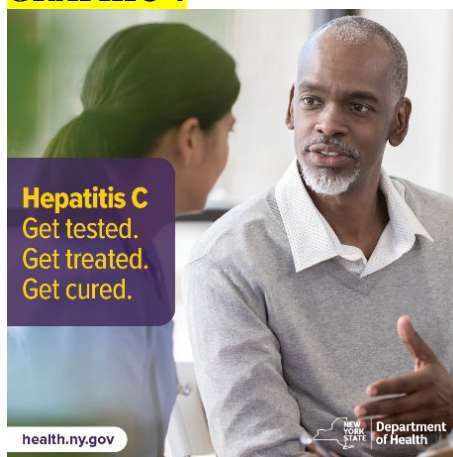

Hepatitis B is spread through direct contact with infected blood or other bodily fluids. Transmission is most common during delivery, but it can also happen through contact with tiny amounts of blood from an infected person who might not even know they have hepatitis B.
