Executive Summary

The New York State Department of Health (the Department) will carry out the following Commodity Supplemental Food Program (CSFP) annual activities during FFY26:

1. Transition administration of the CSFP within the Division of Nutrition from the Bureau of the Child and Adult Care Food Programs to the Bureau of Nutrition Security.
2. Manage contracts for three local agencies (LA's) to provide CSFP services in the New York City and Long Island areas.
3. Conduct physical inventory evaluations for all three LA's and the New York State Office of General Services (OGS).
4. Conduct management evaluations for all three LA's.
5. Provide quality nutrition education information to CSFP participants.
6. Attain 95-100% assigned caseload by working with agencies to conduct effective outreach and reliable scheduling, while preventing dual participation.
7. Distribute 100% of Senior Farmers' Market Nutrition Program (SFMNP) booklets via strategically allocating the Department's assignment, training agencies, and monitoring distributions.
8. Review and update policies and procedures as needed to promote equitable services via accessible and reliable programming to the public.

Below is a summary of accomplishments from FFY25. The Department:

1. Executed contracts for three local agencies (LA's) to provide Commodity Supplemental Food Program (CSFP) in the New York City and Long Island areas.
2. Completed onboarding activities with one local agency.
3. Completed four (4) physical inventory visits with minimal findings.
4. Updated one (1) policy based on final parity rules.
5. Distributed 100% of SFMNP allocation, 33,760 booklets.

Administrative and Fiscal

I) Overview

The New York State Department of Health (Department) has established policies and procedures to ensure local agencies comply with all fiscal and record keeping requirements including but not limited to: 7 Code of Federal Regulations (7 CFR) Parts 247 and 250, Office of Management and Budget (OMB)'s requirements, and General Services Administration (GSA).

II) Fiscal Requirements

Local agencies must submit an annual CSFP budget request, which is reviewed by the Department and approved when all fiscal requirements are met. Budgets may be modified by submitting a Line Item Interchange request, which follows the same approval process as the annual budget. Significant budget modifications require additional Department approvals.

Local agencies may purchase equipment in accordance with USDA guidelines and upon receiving pre-approval from the Department. Travel must follow General Services Administration (GSA) guidelines and be submitted to the Department for pre-approval.

Local agencies must submit monthly claims for reimbursement and supporting documentation for all expenditures to the Department for review and approval prior to payment.

III) Records Retention

The Department has policies and procedures in place to retain accurate and complete records related to USDA donated foods, participant eligibility and activity, administrative funds, and all other program-related materials. The Department holds a contract for an automated system that supports retention of inventory and participant activity. Any information not collected via the automated system is scanned and stored electronically.

Local agencies must make all documents available up on request and establish a disposition plan in their agency policy and procedure manual.

The local agencies receive training on related policies and procedures, and compliance is evaluated on a regular basis.

IV) Emergency Preparedness and Disaster Planning

Local agencies must have an up-to-date emergency disaster plan intended to continue CSFP distributions to the greatest extent during local, regional and national disasters or emergencies. Emergency contact numbers with text messaging capability must be included in that plan.

Caseload and Certification

I) Overview

The New York State Department of Health (the Department) currently serves a caseload of 33,722 participants residing in New York City and Long Island. The final base caseload for FFY25 totaled 33,332. The Department has requested an increase of 390 participants to retain caseload of 33,722. Local agencies will employ ongoing outreach to retain existing participants, recruit new participants, and add new sites when needed.

The Department utilizes Local Agencies (LA) to implement the Commodity Supplemental Food Program (CSFP) in the community. The LA's are selected every five (5) years through a competitive procurement process called a "Request for Applications (RFA)".

The selected LA's perform the following CSFP activities:

- Outreach
- Certification/recertification and provide related notifications
- Referrals
- Nutrition education
- Food package distributions
- Inventory management of USDA donated foods

Outreach conducted by LA's may include partnering with community-based organizations, food pantries, places of worship, housing communities, or other locations/organizations where older adults congregate in an effort to make participation easily accessible. Service to the homebound population is a high priority and LA's are encouraged to employ home delivery services when feasible, use housing communities as mobile sites, and promote the use of proxies. The LA's are also encouraged to promote CSFP services to individuals by way of:

- Public service announcements
- Distribution of electronic and hard copy materials in public locations
- Partnering with organizations and local government offices that serve the target population and make referrals to promote the program

II) Certification Overview

The certification period for the New York CSFP is three (3) years, with an annual review to extend the certification for an additional 12-months between recertification periods.

To be certified as eligible for CSFP participation, the applicant must meet:

- 1) Categorical Eligibility – The applicant must be 60 years of age or older and provide acceptable documentation to verify age.
- 2) Residential Eligibility – The applicant must reside in New York State and provide acceptable documentation to verify residency.
- 3) Income Eligibility – The income of the household must not exceed 150 percent of the Federal Poverty Income Guidelines. Applicants self-declare their income. The automated management information system is updated annually using the income guidelines issued by USDA.

The Department does not require applicants/participants meet nutrition risk criteria.

To remain eligible, the following conditions must be met during the annual review:

- 1) The individual's address is verified using documentation specified in the New York State CSFP Program Manual.
- 2) The individual has a continued interest in the program.
- 3) The local agency has sufficient reason to believe that the individual still meets the income eligibility standards (e.g. the individual has a fixed income).

One-month certifications are permitted when a participant is:

- 1) Unable to provide all supporting documentation at the time of certification/recertification.
- 2) Certified from the waiting list.

III) Manual Certification

Certifications and recertifications must be completed in the automated system, unless the automated system is non-operational.

When certifying applicants, if the CSFP automated system is non-operational, certification and foods distributed must be collected using the NYS CSFP Manual Certification Form and CSFP Food Package Distribution List. The information documented on these forms must be entered in the automated system as soon as the automated system is restored.

IV) Waiting List

Local agencies may only serve eligible persons up to the caseload limit assigned to them by the Department.

When the number of applicants exceeds assigned caseload levels, applicants must be placed on a waiting list on a first-come, first-served basis.

A one-month temporary certification must be offered to wait-listed individuals when an active waiting list exists and assigned caseload will not be met by the end of the monthly distribution period.

V) Race and Ethnicity Data

Participation requirements for the CSFP are the same for everyone regardless of race, color, national origin, sex (including gender identify and sexual orientation), disability, age, or reprisal or retaliation for prior civil rights activity. Local agencies are required to collect race and ethnicity data during the certification process by allowing participants to self-identify and then documenting responses in the automated system. The Department will report an annual summary of race and ethnicity by submitting the FNS-191 Report.

VI) Employee Participants

To minimize the potential for fraud and abuse, local agencies must ensure that proper internal accounting and administrative controls are in place. When a CSFP staff person is provided with CSFP program services, he or she must meet the same

eligibility requirements, provide all required information, and receive the same services as any other CSFP participant. In addition, CSFP employees must not participate as a local agency representative in the certification and food issuance activities for themselves, relatives or close friends.

VII) Proxy Authorization

The Department encourages participants to designate a proxy to allow for receipt of CSFP benefits when they are unable to pick up food packages themselves. The Department procedure related to proxy authorization is designed to protect both the participant and the local agency staff by ensuring that only those persons designated and authorized by the participant are issued CSFP foods.

VIII) Dual Participation

Participants may not receive CSFP benefits from more than one CSFP site for the same calendar month. The following describes how the Department manages dual participation:

- 1) Prevention- LA's must:
 - a) Ask each applicant if they are currently receiving CSFP benefits from another site or local agency.
 - b) Screen the automated system by searching applicant name and date of birth prior to proceeding with certification activities.
 - c) Review Participant Rights & Responsibilities at the time of certification, which includes the responsibility of receiving only one monthly food package.
- 2) Detection- Each month the Department will perform a search by participant name and date of birth to identify instances of dual participation.
- 3) Correction- If dual participants are identified, the Department:
 - a) Notifies the agency(ies) involved.
 - b) Provides instructions that result in the participant having just one active certification record at a site/agency of their choice.
 - c) Conducts a record review to ensure the appropriate actions have been taken.

IX) No Shows for Food Package

The Department is committed to ensuring participants receive CSFP food packages on a monthly basis. To keep participants engaged, the LA are required to:

- 1) Inform participants of program rights and responsibilities related to monthly participation during certification/recertification visits.
- 2) Notify participants of their upcoming monthly distribution.

- 3) Contact participants when a distribution is missed and encourage them to pick up at another location convenient to them within the same month.
- 4) Reach out to participants when one month of distribution is missed, encourage attendance at the next opportunity and for the participant to designate a proxy.
- 5) Notify participants who miss two or more distributions that their CSFP participation has been discontinued including steps to take if they are interested in recertifying in the future. This allows wait listed participants an opportunity to fully participate in the program.

Confidentiality

I) Participant Confidentiality and Release of Information

The Department requires LA's to protect the right to privacy of CSFP applicants and participants, and keep their information confidential by ensuring:

- 1) All information that individually identifies CSFP participants and applicants is confidential.
- 2) Applicant and participant information with individual identifiers are not released without written consent of the applicant or participant, except as required by law.
- 3) The local agency can only provide applicants and participants access to information that the applicant or participant has provided to CSFP.
- 4) Disclosure of information is limited to persons directly connected with the administration or enforcement of the program, including persons investigating or prosecuting program violations.
- 5) Local agencies have specific policies and procedures to address disclosure of information.

Civil Rights, Fair Hearings and Complaints

I) Civil Rights and Nondiscrimination Statement

The Department and LA's comply with state and federal civil rights laws by:

- 1) Providing equal treatment to all participants, applicants and employees in compliance with all federal and state regulations and policies concerning civil rights and nondiscrimination.
- 2) Including the nondiscrimination statement on all material produced for public information, public education, or public distribution.
- 3) Completing annual civil rights training that complies with all civil rights requirements, including procedures for handling complaints.
- 4) Processing complaints in accordance with procedures provided by the USDA and the Department.

II) Fair Hearings

The Department ensures that applicants, participants and their proxies have the right to request an appeal, verbally or in writing, of any adverse action or decision that results in the individual's denial of participation, disqualification from CSFP, and/or repayment of program benefits.

When an applicant or participant is deemed ineligible for program services, the local agency must provide written notification to the applicant, participant, or proxy of their right to request a conference and/or fair hearing.

When an applicant, participant, or proxy requests a fair hearing, the local agency must refer the request to the Department.

III) Participant Complaints about Service

The Department requires LA's to report all complaints regarding program services to the Department. A complaint form is provided for LA's to use and the Department will assist in resolution as needed. It is recommended that LA staff participate in annual training on customer service and deescalating strategies to diffuse problematic situations.

IV) Program Violations

The Department has established procedures to handle program violations that are dependent on the number of violations committed and severity of the violations, including when local agencies should initiate claims against participants.

For USDA commodities that were improperly received or used, the threshold for establishing a participant claim is \$1,000 or more. The Local Agency is required to use this standard in accordance with 7 CFR, Part 247.30 and applicable State Agency policies and procedures.

The dollar amount not to be exceeded will be evaluated once every five years.

USDA Donated Foods

I) Overview

The New York State Department of Health has a system for storing and distributing USDA donated foods that is intended to promote proper distribution of foods and prevent loss from improper handling and storage. Supporting policies and procedures require local agencies to comply with all Federal, State, and local requirements on food safety and health, including all necessary inspections and procedures for responding to a food recall.

The Department relies primarily on direct delivery of USDA donated foods to a central warehouse where the food is then broken down into smaller amounts and delivered to local agencies as needed. One local agency receives direct deliveries to support some of their inventory needs and then the remainder is supplied by the central warehouse.

Movement of food, from the original order through distribution to participants, is documented in the automated system and any additional paperwork is saved electronically.

II) Inventory Management

Local agencies must maintain a two to four-week supply of USDA donated foods to support assigned caseload and monthly food distribution rates. Local agencies must store USDA donated foods separately from other foods in storage, protect them from theft, spoilage, damage, infestation or other loss at all times. A monthly physical count is required, as well as an annual count by the Department. The local agency must maintain accurate and complete records relating to the receipt, distribution, disposal and inventory of USDA donated foods. The Department will establish claims against local agencies for food loss per USDA regulation.

III) Out-of-Condition Donated Foods, Complaints, and Food Recalls

Local agencies must notify the Department for approval to dispose of all USDA donated foods that are deemed unfit for human consumption prior to disposal. Local agencies must notify the Department of any participant complaints received for USDA donated foods that are out of condition. Local agencies must designate responsible staff members to manage all USDA food recalls and provide contact information including cell phone numbers capable of receiving text messages and email addresses.

Food Package Issuance

I) Overview

The New York State Department of Health has established policies and procedures to ensure that local agencies issue foods to certified participants in accordance with the CSFP maximum monthly distribution rates, identification requirements and that participants are never asked to provide payment for USDA donated foods received as part of CSFP participation. In addition, USDA donated foods may only be used for allowable program purposes limited to participant distributions and cooking demonstrations as part of the CSFP nutrition education efforts.

Local agencies often partner with local community-based organizations, food pantries, housing authorities, faith based organizations, and other organizations that serve older adults to assist in reaching CSFP eligible populations and provide services in convenient locations. All mobile sites must be established in accordance with state and Federal regulations and have a Memorandum of Understanding in place.

II) Food Package Issuance

1. Local agencies must issue a complete Commodity Supplemental Food Program (CSFP) food package to each participant, in accordance with the CSFP Maximum Monthly Distribution Rates.
2. Local agencies must require each participant or participant's proxy to present a valid form of identification before distributing commodities to that person.
3. Local agencies **must not** require or request that participants make any payments or provide any materials or services in connection with the receipt of CSFP commodities.
4. CSFP commodities must only be used for monthly distribution to CSFP participants and cooking demonstrations as part of the CSFP nutrition education program. Local agencies **may not** use CSFP commodities for outreach, refreshments or any other purposes.

III) Mobile Site Operations

1. Local agencies must request and receive New York State Department of Health (the Department) approval prior to any mobile site opening, transition or closure activity.

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2. The local agency must follow Federal regulations and established State-issued policies and procedures when conducting CSFP services at mobile sites.

Nutrition Education

I) Overview

Nutrition education is an integral part of the CFSP. It has the dual purpose of ensuring that USDA donated foods are used properly as well as providing information that encourages continued selection and consumption of nutritious foods.

Requirements for nutrition education are specified in the CSFP Work Plan as part of the local agency contract with the Department. In addition, the Department provides policies, procedures and resources to assist local agencies with preparing their annual nutrition education plans.

II) Annual Nutrition Education Activities

The Department requires LA's to submit an annual nutrition education plan. The plan must outline how they will provide the following:

- Nutrition education materials or presentations on a monthly basis that include the following messages:
 - Nutritional value of CSFP foods and their relationship to nutritional needs of participants'
 - Nutritious ways to use CSFP foods
 - Special nutritional needs of participants and how these needs may be met
 - Importance of health care and how nutrition aids in maintaining good health; and
 - Foods provided are intended to be used by the participant who received them, and not by another person
- A CSFP newsletter on a quarterly basis.
- An annual participant survey to evaluate the effectiveness of the education and allow for participant input.

All materials must be easily understood by CSFP participants, be relatable to their nutritional needs/household situations and:

- Be available in languages other than English
- Address culturally appropriate and ethnic dietary practices of participants
- Consider the literacy skills of participants
- Use plain language guidelines for clear communication

Senior Farmers' Market Nutrition Program

I) Overview

The New York State Department of Health (the Department) partners with the New York State Department of Agriculture and Markets to issue Senior Farmers' Market Nutrition Program booklets to CSFP participants. This partnership is intended to promote food security and increase consumption of locally grown fresh fruits and vegetables.

II) Senior Farmers Market Nutrition Program

1. Local agencies must issue Senior Farmers' Market Nutrition Program (SFMNP) booklets as early as June 1st through September 30th each year.
2. Local agencies are expected to distribute 100% of allotted booklets.
3. Local agencies must only issue one SFMNP booklet annually per CSFP participant.
4. Local agencies must instruct participants on the proper use of SFMNP coupons and provide a list of authorized SFMNP markets.

Management Information Systems

I) Overview

The New York State Department of Health (the Department) provides a management information system to Local agencies to capture participant and inventory-related data in real time. Local agencies must follow all policies and procedures related to proper use and security of hardware, software, and data.

II) Equipment and Password Security

1. All equipment provided by the Department or purchased using CSFP funds must be used for the sole purpose of conducting CSFP program operations.
2. Local agencies are responsible for operating and safeguarding Department-issued equipment.
3. Local agencies may not add, modify or remove any software or hardware from Department-issued equipment without written authorization from the Department.
4. Local agencies are responsible for any damages resulting from improper or accidental access to Department-issued devices.
5. Local agencies are responsible for protecting personal, private and sensitive information from unauthorized use or disclosure.
6. Local agency staff must not share computer passwords.
